An Early Start Denver Model-Based Virtual Group Program for Parents of Infants and Toddlers

Early Start For Your Child

Program Eligibility Requirements

Participants must:

- Be parent/caregiver of a 12-47 month old infant or toddler
- The infant or toddler must be:
 - a) Diagnosed with ASD
 - b) At genetic risk for ASD
- Be motivated to learn skills for promoting infant/toddler development
- Be able to participate in all training sessions
- Participate in 12 weeks of program provided once per week (starting end of January, day of the week TBD)
- Be willing to complete pre/post assessments

The Center for Autism and Related Disabilities is now offering a group for parents of infants/toddlers diagnosed with ASD

An Early Start Denver Model-based virtual group program is being offered at <u>no cost</u> through the Center for Autism and Related Disabilities at the University at Albany. This group program provides parents with training and tools to promote their very young children's social and communicative development. The program includes small-group instruction to help parents learn real-world skills that will help them interact with their infants/toddlers in a way that has been shown to elicit social and communicative behaviors. Participants are asked to complete pre/post assessments in order for us to evaluate the effectiveness of this program.

AFFORDABLE CONNECTIVITY PROGRAM HELPING HOUSEHOLDS CONNECT

The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC program that helps connect families and households struggling to afford internet service.

The Affordable Connectivity Program provides:

- Up to \$30/month discount for broadband service
- Up to \$75/month discount for households on qualifying Tribal lands
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet purchased through a participating provider if the household contributes more than \$10 but less than \$50 toward the purchase price.

The Affordable Connectivity Program is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?



A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if the household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or if a member of the household meets at least one of the criteria below:

- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year
- Participates in the Free and reduced-Price School Lunch Program or the School Breakfast Program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income internet program
- · Participates in one of these assistance programs:
 - SNAP
 - Medicaid
 - Federal Public Housing Assistance
 - Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
 - WIC
 - Veterans Pension or Survivor Benefits
 - or Lifeline;
- · Participates in one of these assistance programs and lives on Qualifying Tribal lands:
 - Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance
 - Tribal TANF
 - Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
 - Tribal Head Start (income based)

TWO STEPS TO ENROLL

Step 1: Go to AffordableConnectivity.gov to submit an application or print out a mail-in application.
Step 2: Contact your preferred participating provider to select a plan and have the discount applied to your bill.

Some providers may have an alternative application that they will ask you to complete. Eligible households must both apply for the program and contact a participating provider to select a service plan.
